Robert J. Maxon

Grosse Pointe Woods resident Robert J. Maxon, died Wednesday, July 12, 2017, his 90th birthday.

Born July 12, 1927, in Detroit, to Harry and Blanche Maxon, Robert graduated from Cass Technical High School in Detroit. He served in the U.S. Navy as a fireman 1st class during World War II.

Robert started his career as a salesman and progressed to the position of executive vice president with Invetech/Detroit Ball Bearing. After 40 years, Robert retired and he and Joanne moved to Palm Desert, Calif. They returned to Grosse Pointe Woods in 2014.

Robert enjoyed yacht racing on Lake St. Clair and in the Port Huron to Mackinac races and was a member of Crescent Sail Yacht Club. He also was an avid golfer and a member of Lochmoor Club and Palm Valley Country Club of Palm Desert. Robert maintained an active membership with the Grosse Pointe Senior Men's Club and the American Legion.

Robert is survived by his wife of 64 years, Joanne Hoxley Maxon; daughter, Barbara Calkins (Robert); sons, Robert J. Maxon Jr. (Robin) and Richard Maxon (Karyln); grandchildren, Sara, Bonnie, Kathleen and Bobby; and seven great-grandchildren.

He was predeceased by his sister, Paula and brothers, Stanley and

George. Robert will be remembered by those who knew him as a compassionate family man, active member of his community and professional mentor to many. He will be deeply missed.

Red Cross blood shortage continues

Thousands of people have responded to the emergency call for blood and platelet donations issued by the American Red Cross in early July, but there continues to be a critical summer blood shortage. Eligible donors of all types are urgently needed.

After issuing the emergency call, the Red Cross has experienced a 30 percent increase in blood donation appointments through mid-July. About half of the appointments were scheduled by donors using the free Blood Donor App at redcross-blood.org. Despite this improvement, blood products are still being distributed to hospitals as fast as donations are coming in, so more donations are needed to meet patient needs and replenish the blood supply.

"The blood supply is like a cell phone battery. It constantly needs recharging," said Todd Kuitman, external communications manager of the Southeastern Michigan Blood Services Region. "We sincerely appreciate those who have responded to the call to help save lives and encourage those who haven't to consider rolling up a sleeve and give the gift of life. It only takes about an hour but can mean a lifetime for patients."

Nearly 61,000 fewer blood donations than needed were given through the Red Cross in May and June, prompting the emergency call for donations in early July. The shortfall was the equivalent of the Red Cross not receiving any blood donations for more than four days.

Blood shortages could lead to delays in patient care, something Arthur Bourget learned firsthand after being diagnosed with leukemia in July 2007. When he arrived for his second blood transfusion, he was told the blood he needed was not available. He waited eight hours for blood to arrive and to receive the transfusion he needed that day.

"One thing that I committed to my wife was that I was going to beat leukemia, no matter what, and I was going to do that," said Bourget. "But what I wasn't going to be able to do was survive without the blood that I needed."

Bourget went into remission following a successful treatment plan, which included 28 blood and 34 platelet transfusions. He has been a faithful advocate for blood donations ever since.

"If it wasn't for the generosity of volunteer blood donors, I would not be here today," he said. "My daughter would not have a father and my wife would not have a husband. Thank you and please give blood. You may never know the life you have saved, but I guarantee they will never forget you."

How to help

To schedule an appointment to donate, use the Blood Donor App, visit redcrossblood.org or call (800) 733-2787. Donation appointments and completion of a RapidPass online health history questionnaire are encouraged to help reduce the time it takes to donate.

As a special thank you, those who come out to give blood or platelets with the Red Cross through Aug. 31 will be emailed a \$5 Target eGiftCard.

Keeping cool and hydrated this summer

Whether a humid 80-degree July afternoon or a breezy 70-degree evening, chilling out with the right food and beverages can hydrate and boost energy during long, hot summer days.

Local health expert Maurice Paine, manager of the Better Health Store in Grosse Pointe Woods, is on a mission to educate others about the importance of hydration.

 1/2 banana
 1/2 carrot
 1 small tomato
 1 stalk celery
 1 slice beet
 1 1/2-inch slice ginger
 1/2 cup chia or flax meal
 20 grams protein powder
 1/2 teaspoon Celtic sea salt
 1 tablespoon lecithin granules
 8 ounces kombucha
 Green food (kale, sprouts, wheatgrass or spirulina)
 1/2 cup coconut oil
 Blend all ingredients until smooth.

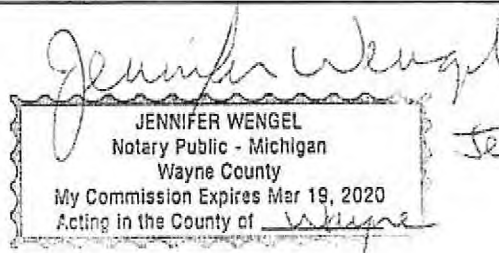
